Common Nouns and Proper Nouns

A **noun** names a person, place, or thing.

A **common noun** names a person, place, or thing that is **not specific**.

A **proper noun** names a **specific** person, place, or thing. Proper nouns always start with **capital letters**. Look at the examples below.

Common Nouns (not specific)Proper Nouns (specific)monthMarch, SeptembercityChicago, TulsapersonMrs. Green, Jay, Uncle Ken, Dr. WilsonpresidentPresident George Washington

mayor Mayor Kerry Ali

Remember to use capital letters for the types of proper nouns shown below. Note that there is usually **no** capital letter on *the* before a proper noun.

	Examples of Proper Nouns
Names of countries , states , and cities	Australia, Wyoming, St. Louis
Names of people , including any initials, and names given to pets	Richard E. Wilson, Fluffy
Names of days of the week, months, holidays, and other special days	Saturday, December, Thanksgiving, Groundhog Day
Names of buildings , bridges , and monuments	Empire State Building, The Golden Gate Bridge, Washington Monument
Names of languages and nationalities	French, Spanish, Greek
Names of geographical places and features	the Rocky Mountains, Yellowstone National Park, Lake Erie, the Mississippi River
Names of objects in space , such as planets , galaxies , and comets	Mars, the Milky Way, Halley's Comet
Names of historical events and periods	World War II, the Middle Ages
Names of awards and prizes	Employee of the Month, the Nobel Prize
Names of organizations and	the United Nations, the World Health
companies	Organization, Free the Children, NoFrills, Metro
Job titles*	Queen Elizabeth, President Ghali, Police Chief Patel, Governor Carter, Mayor Chan Lee, Dr. Smith, Mrs. Katya Petrov

[•] Note that a job title gets a capital letter only when it comes right before a person's name.
